Immunizations

It is Colorado law that your student is either fully vaccinated or has an exemption form signed every year to attend public schools. Tdap is required upon entry to 6th grade. If your 6th grader has not gotten their Tdap or you have received a non-compliance letter, please call the Health Office. Our Health Assistant, Kathy, can help you and let you know what paperwork is needed! If your student has gotten immunizations, please provide paper documentation to the Health office, so it can be entered in our system!

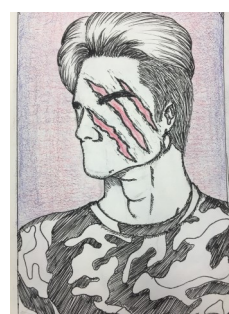

Select Band 2018 is November 16th and 17th, and this year the event will be held at the Montrose Pavilion. Select Band is like an honor band made up of the top 10% or so of band students from 25 Western Slope Middle Schools. They play music that is challenging and interesting. Selected students learn their part on their own, and then get together for a weekend of auditions, sectionals, rehearsals and a then a concert. There is also a separate high school group that shares the concert. Select Band does not happen all year. Students are nominated by their director in September, a committee goes through the nominations in early October, and the event itself takes place the Friday and Saturday before Thanksgiving. Middle schools take mainly 8th grade students because of their experience, maturity, and musicianship. 6th and 7th graders may attend if they are qualified. Directors nominate students according to their musicianship and maturity. Tone Quality and Technical Ability figure in as well as the ability to read music and level of focus in class. A committee then puts together a band with a sort of draft process. So even though you have to be a great student to get it, not all great students make it in. We like to include students from smaller rural schools that might have only 18 total people in their band as well as students from larger city schools like Grand Junction or Montrose.
